Leading the way for End-of-Life Care Discussions on the Western Slope



"How do we improve the lives of our frailest, most vulnerable members of our community?" asked Dr. David West, VP of Medical Affairs at HopeWest.

"With medicine's focus on sustaining life, preventing death and making patients well, how do we change the medical culture to also take care of people who are living longer and have chronic, incurable illnesses?"

These are a few of the many questions Dr. West has pondered over the years. He now has the opportunity to collaborate and develop solutions with over 300 physicians in the Mesa County Physicians Independent Practice Association (MCPIPA).

"Over the past 120 years of health care there have been incredible advances," said Dr. West. "Life expectancy has gone from 45 years to nearly 85 years and Americans now live much longer and healthier lives. Despite these medical advancements, our bodies wear down as we age. Today, 90% of us are dying not just of one condition, but with many chronic and incurable conditions such as heart failure, arthritis, emphysema and dementia. At HopeWest, we believe in treating the whole person, not just the many conditions a person may be suffering from."

The education initiative with HopeWest and MCPIPA kicked off in January 2016, beginning with a series of presentations Dr. West gave on the importance of advance directives and how to start a conversation about end-of-life care wishes. Each physician also received the book *Being Mortal* by Atul Gawande, a New York Times best-seller, to read over the next few months. The physicians will regroup in the fall to discuss what they learned.

"We're excited to see how this can help people's quality of life here in Mesa County," said Dr. West. "What we've learned is that as people age, some medications and procedures aren't as helpful as they once were, but we continue to practice medicine in this way. These practices are not only unhelpful, but can be harmful. Instead of curing, the focus needs to become how to help people live their life, as best as possible to the end." The education Dr. West is giving is showing doctors another way to practice medicine – focusing on patient goals and quality of life.

In the spring physicians will create plans on how they will incorporate what they learned from Dr. West's presentation into their practices. In the fall, physicians will meet for a book study on *Being Mortal*. In the winter physicians will attend another presentation from Dr. West, this time focusing on helpful palliative care practices. These are all positive steps forward in bringing more awareness to end-of-life care.

Middle school kids in Meeker raise money for HopeWest!



Willie Hernandez was feeling a little down one day. It's understandable, given that it's the middle of the winter in Grand Junction, where he and his wife live at Grand Villa Care Center. He and Faye are a long way from home.

Willie is 71 and Faye is 79. "Am I 79?" she asks Willie, looking sheepishly at him through the corner of her eye. "Yeah, going on 58," he replies, chuckling. They're both HopeWest hospice patients — Willie suffers from congestive heart failure, chronic obstructive pulmonary disease, diabetes and other associated health issues, and Faye has dementia.

On that day, Willie and Faye had a visit from HopeWest Chaplain Jef Ray, and Willie told him he was feeling homesick for New Orleans. His heart was more than 1,400 miles away, and he was here, not feeling so good.

It's not uncommon for chaplains to help patients identify things they wish they could do before they

die, and so that's what Ray did, despite the fact that Willie and Faye's health would not allow for the physical journey.

"I said, 'What would you do, if you could go back tomorrow?' " Ray said.

Willie replied that he would go to Jackson Square and sit on the patio of Cafe du Monde, a famous restaurant in the French Quarter.

" 'I'd like a beignet and a coffee and I would just be,' he told me," Ray said.

For some people, identifying something on a bucket list, an experience missing from life, is going skydiving or something more monumental.

But for Willie, it really was just about a taste of home to ease the sense of something missing in his heart. So the team of employees who work with Willie and Faye made it happen. Bre Long, a HopeWest team assistant who had never met the couple before,

In her spare time, Long tried her hand at making beignets, the famous powdered-sugar covered, fried donut-like confection from The Big Easy. The result delighted Willie and Faye, when the team delivered the treats with authentic chicory coffee and Mardi Gras masks.

The taste took them back to the patio of Cafe du Monde, with jazz playing in the background and po' boys made with fried oysters.

It took Willie back to when he first met Faye, at a piano bar where she walked in with a girlfriend, 39 years ago in Metairie, Louisiana.

He was drinking a cuba libre, and he "gave her the eye and that was that, and then we danced and she kissed me because she liked me."

The years that passed in between didn't matter anymore, the time when they worked at her brother's peanut shack and Willie boiled the peanuts and

Faye sold the peanuts in paper bags, and after that she was a cashier and he made a living working in security for hotels and prisons.

For Willie and Faye, this kind of gift went above and beyond the health care that HopeWest has provided them over the years.


The kind of concern and attention to fulfilling small wishes like this is just evidence that the care team has become part of their family, said Faye's daughter, Tasha Peters.

"It means a lot that somebody cares," Willie said, still licking his lips at the thought of the beignets.

Bringing back memories is made possible through the connections HopeWest makes with patients, beyond all the official paperwork and medical services, Ray said.

It's about more than making sweet treats and doing a little extra. "This is something they've identified and has been deep in their heart all along," Ray said. "Most everybody, you, me, but most definitely people that are dying, they want to find meaning in each day and I think that's all Willie was looking for."
